Over this Labor Day weekend, I have continued to reflect on the hearts, minds and spirits of the willing workers in our community, nation and the world. These last eighteen months have drained the spirits of people in ways we still do not fully comprehend. Medical personnel, mental health professionals, teachers, emergency personnel, leaders at all levels, clergy, frontline workers and others have grown weary facing the effects of the pandemic day after day. People who have worked all their lives to build businesses, careers, and livelihoods to support their families have lost everything despite their commitments and efforts.

But as I continue to reflect on the physical, emotional and spiritual condition of our country, I am drawn beyond just the people in the workforce. Many of our elderly friends and neighbors, who often live isolated lives, have grown even more weary and despairing in their isolation. Just when hope for a brighter tomorrow seemed to be on the horizon, full of possibilities with the joy of seeing friends' and loved ones' unmasked smiles and exchanging life-giving embraces, the coronavirus delta variant sent many of our more vulnerable neighbors scurrying back to the remote corners of their lives. And of course, almost everyone has felt the pain and trepidation of someone they care about battling the coronavirus.

Additionally, in this week in which we remember the shock and horror of 9/11 and the emotional and spiritual trauma and reverberations felt by the American people, we also recall the emotional and soul weariness we experienced as rescue efforts continued and the reality sank in that the American people were not impervious to attack and destruction.

These types of bone-deep weariness invite us to find comfort and solace beyond human capacity. When Jesus was teaching the crowds, he told them, *“<sup>28</sup> Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. <sup>29</sup> Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. <sup>30</sup> For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light.”*

In this time of physical, emotional, spiritual, and mental weariness, we need the restful and restorative healing that only time with Jesus can give us. We need to offer our burdens, our cares, our hurts, our transgressions, our doubts, our very selves to the one who has promised to give us rest. We can trust and depend on his love and grace to see us through these difficult times. After all, Jesus suffered for us that we might have life and have it abundantly.

But to receive this abundant life, we must trust Jesus and let go. I don't know about you, but sometimes what I really need is to imagine myself crawling up in Jesus' lap where I am safe and loved. I've even been known to imagine myself napping there. Do you need a nap with Jesus? It can restore your soul!



Hola, mi familia.

The choir anthem this Sunday is a medley and one of the songs in that medley is "Fairest Lord Jesus", one of the first hymns I learned to play as a young girl. This beautiful hymn has a somewhat elusive history. The best known legend is that it was sung by 12<sup>th</sup> century German crusaders as they made their long, weary way to the Holy Land. We do know the hymn was copied later from a Jesuit manuscript(1662) produced in Munster Westphalia(Germany) and first appeared in a Catholic hymn book in 1677. We still have no record of authors for either the text or tune. It remains anonymous.

Hungarian composer Franz Liszt famously employed this Crusaders' hymn tune in his 1864 oratorio, "The Legend of St. Elizabeth". The song has endured, published in many hymnals through the centuries under different tune names.....ST.ELIZABETH, SCHONSTER HERR JESU, BEAUTIFUL SAVIOR, CRUSADERS' HYMN, and ASCALON.

The song praises Jesus as the Savior of man and ruler of all nature, illustrating His divine sovereignty over creation as the Son of God. Without doubt, this hymn is near and dear to all of us, and has been, and will continue to be.
