One of my favorite Scripture passages that we often hear this time of year is found in the Gospel of John. It is a passage describing Jesus' arrival on Earth that most of us have heard so many times that the reverberation of the word in our hearts may have lost some of their power. A few years ago, I heard this very familiar passage read from Eugene Peterson's paraphrased Bible translation, *The Message*. This contemporary translation caught me by surprise and offered a renewed sense of Jesus' presence in his earthly kingdom.

"The Word became flesh and blood, and moved into the neighborhood." (John 1:14a) Wow! The thought of Jesus moving into the neighborhood has a very different feel from Jesus being born in a manger over 2000 years ago in the faraway city of Bethlehem. Jesus moving into the neighborhood – our neighborhood – is much more personal, more convicting. Jesus moving into the neighborhood causes me to ponder what would Jesus see, what would he hear, what would he know about us and our commitment to our neighborhood.

From my short 1½ years at Lakeside, I believe Jesus would see a church family who is committed to financially supporting helping ministries in our community and beyond. Jesus would also see generous church members who give food, toiletries, books, candy, Easter eggs, and more to share Christ's love with their neighbors. He would see faithful servants giving their time and energy to feed children and improve their literacy skills, supporting teachers at Broadmoor Elementary school, feeding dozens of families through regular food distributions, ensuring that children receive a joyful Christmas and people in need are met with respect and love. Jesus would see Lakeside striving to be the church that He commanded us to be.

But Jesus never leaves us where He finds us. Since His work will not be completed until His kingdom reigns on Earth as in heaven, Jesus invites us to continue growing into His likeness.

Last week the Mission Team heard a presentation about Project Transformation that is coming to Pine Bluff in the summer of 2022. Rev. Sam Meadors, who is currently serving as the Delta Project Coordinator for Arkansas' 200,000 More Reasons ministry and worked closely with Lakeside in our 2021 summer feeding and reading ministry, will be the new Director of Project Transformation. Project Transformation will not only provide literacy training for underserved children in the Pine Bluff community, but it will also be a vital opportunity for college students to serve as interns and possibly discern a call into ministry. Numerous interns in Arkansas who have served in Project Transformation, including Rev. Meadors, have discerned calls to ministry.

Lakeside is applying to be one of two host churches in the Pine Bluff area during the summer of 2022. When I think of Jesus moving into our community and looking at Lakeside, I imagine Him smiling as he sees the children and young adults nurturing and nourishing their love for Him through ministries such as Project Transformation. Will you join me in praying fervently that Lakeside can be the hands, feet, heart and voice of Jesus through this vital ministry?

From Rene



Hola, mi familia. I've been thinking about the hymn "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" for a couple of days. Its haunting melody is one of my favorites—the first hymn I think of as an Advent carol, and traditionally the first hymn sung on the first Sunday of Advent and other Sundays in Advent.

This hymn has quite a sketchy past, as do many of our older hymns. Our Methodist hymnal denotes that the words were originally written in Latin in the 9th century, hence the tune name VENI EMMANUEL. The title in the words refers to the Hebrew 'Immanuel' meaning 'God's protection with us', or as we say 'God with us', and first appears in the book of Isaiah in the Old Testament. In the Gospel of Matthew in the New Testament, Emmanuel refers to the person of Jesus Christ. The melody of the hymn dates back to 15th century France, but it wasn't until the 1960's that musicologist Mary Berry uncovered the tune's 15th century manuscript that bore the building blocks of the melody we now sing. The English translation of the words was done in 1851 by John Mason Neale, a priest and scholar. (Neale also wrote the words to "Good King Wenceslas".)

So, the actual composer of the music and the words for one of the world's most popular carols is enigmatically unknown. However, the combination of the tune with Neale's translation of the Latin, has become a perennial favorite. God is with us, my friends. Take comfort in that. Good shall overcome. Shalom, shalom
